 - BRAINS N' BOOZE: ACUTE COGNITIVE NEURODYNAMICS AND NEUROADAPTATION TO HEAVY USE. Even in the absence of behavioral deficits, we have found significant neuroadaptive changes in young binge drinkers across different neurofunctional domains. These neural changes may signify early steps toward compulsive problem drinking. This talk will be important for graduate researchers in biological psychology and also for those working with adolescents and emerging adults.
