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Welcome Message from WPA President

Thank you very much for the opportunity to serve WPA as President during this 99th year of our history. Reading through the list of WPA presidents, including Lewis Terman and Edward Tolman, is truly humbling.

As we look toward a terrific 99th year, with our 2020 Centennial just around the corner, it's fun to reflect on where WPA has been. According to Lindsley and Harrell (1964), the Western Psychological Association was organized in 1921 with eight full and six associate members. Full membership apparently required membership in the American Psychological Association. Dues were set at \$1, with an additional \$1.50 required for those attending the annual banquet. The first convention was hosted by U.C. Berkeley with assistance from Stanford, so it seems especially fitting that our Centennial will return to the Bay Area, with Christina Maslach of Berkeley serving as President for this momentous year. In contrast to the original 1921 attendance of 14 people, the 2018 Convention in Portland attracted nearly 3000 attendees, setting a new record for WPA.

We're hard at work planning the 2019 Convention, which will be held April 25-28 at the Pasadena Convention Center. I'm especially excited about returning to Pasadena, having grown up a stone's throw away and having done my first non-TA teaching at Pasadena City College during my grad school years at UCLA. This year's program is in the very capable hands of Heidi Riggio and Steven Frenda of Cal State LA.

This is the first time that a WPA Convention will be held in a convention center rather than a hotel. We want to make the most of this fantastic space by bringing in as many remarkable presenters as possible. Confirmed speakers features a who's who of our region's psychology, including Phil Zimbardo, Christina Maslach, Elizabeth Loftus, Bob Bjork, Diane Halpern, Annette Stanton, Stewart Donaldson, Kim Elsesser, Robert Levine, Leslie Martin, Martin Monti, Henry Schlinger, Aaron Seitz, Roxane Cohen Silver, Jodie Ullman, and Allison Vaughn. We are also coordinating with Stephanie Cacioppo of the University of Chicago to bring you special programming in memory of John Cacioppo.

Our space at the Convention Center will accommodate a record number of posters, so we encourage you to get your own research in shape and to spread the word about this marvelous opportunity. WPA remains one of the most student-friendly conventions in psychology. We are also happy to report the return of the ever-popular WPA dance. Not only is Pasadena close to the many attractions of Los Angeles, but it has unique attractions of its own, including an active club and dining scene, numerous museums including the Norton Simon Museum, and beautiful outdoor spaces like the Huntington Library. Your breaks in the program might be spent practicing your Olympic moves at the ice rink adjacent to the Convention Center.

Supporting our efforts to bring you the best conventions possible are Chris Cozby, our WPA Executive Officer, and Lorraine Grogan, our WPA Administrator. To say that their contributions are invaluable is an understatement. Our 2019 Board of Directors (Christina Maslach, President-Elect, Terry Cronan, Past President, Melinda Blackman, Treasurer, Ethan McMahon, Representative-at-Large, and Chris Warren, Secretary), along with our Council of Representatives and student volunteers, work tirelessly on behalf of WPA. We can always use more help, though, so please let us know if you would like to be more involved.

Although much has changed since our first convention in 1921, the essential character of WPA remains the same. In the words of Lindsley and Harrell in 1964, "The relative spirit of progress and newness in this Western Region, with the two newest states of Alaska and Hawaii, gives a spirit of adventure and initiative to the WPA which can also look back toward a distinguished history when it needs to seek security. Its continued growth looks promising."

On behalf of the 2019 WPA Board of Directors, thank you for your continued support of WPA, and we hope to see you in Pasadena next April.

Christina Maslach, WPA President-Elect

WPA is pleased to announce the election of Dr. Christina Maslach as President-Elect. Dr. Maslach will serve on the WPA Board for a 3-year period and will be our WPA President during 2019-2020, when WPA will celebrate its 100th year. Dr. Maslach received her undergraduate degree in Social Relations from Harvard, and her doctorate in Social Psychology from Stanford. She has been a professor in the Psychology Department at the University of California at Berkeley since 1971, and retired in 2013. She has conducted both laboratory and field research in a number of areas within social and health psychology, but is best known for her pioneering work on job burnout, which has produced the standard assessment tool, books, and award-winning articles. Last year, she received the 2017 Application of Personality and Social Psychology Award for her work on burnout, and she is now a researcher at the Healthy Workplaces interdisciplinary center at UC-Berkeley.



Dr. Maslach served as president of the Western Psychological Association in 1988-1989, and helped negotiate an historic first joint convention of WPA and the Rocky Mountain Psychological Association in Reno, Nevada. Currently, she and Dr. Philip Zimbardo are co-chairs of the WPA Centennial Planning Committee, for the 2020 WPA Convention that will be held in San Francisco. She is looking forward to welcoming everyone to that very special, historic celebration of 100 years of psychology in the west!



Ethan McMahan, Representative-at-Large

WPA is pleased to announce the election of Dr. Ethan A. McMahan as WPA Representative-at-Large. Dr. McMahan will serve in this position for a three-year term spanning 2018-2021. Dr. McMahan earned his undergraduate degree in Psychology from the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs and his master's and doctoral degrees in Experimental Psychology from the University of Wyoming. He is currently an Associate Professor of Psychological Science and Chair of the Behavioral Sciences Division at Western Oregon University. Dr. McMahan's research interests concern examining the effects of natural environments on emotion and cognition, with particular emphasis placed on how interaction with nature promotes positive psychological functioning. In addition to conducting

research, Dr. McMahan is passionate about getting his students involved in scholarship and has served as the Coordinator of the Undergraduate Research Program at Western Oregon University and as the Western Regional Vice President for Psi Chi, the international honor society in psychology. Dr. McMahan has been a member of WPA for several years and has attended every WPA conference since moving to the Western region in 2010. He is excited to serve the association as Representative-at-Large in the upcoming years.

Leslie Martin
Received the 2018 Outstanding Teaching Award

Dr. Leslie Martin, a Professor of Psychology and former chair at La Sierra University, has made sterling teaching contributions at multiple levels. In 2004, Dr. Martin received the G.T. Anderson Award for Excellence in Teaching at La Sierra University, an award only given out every three years. Dr. Martin has gone beyond departmental teaching and developed four service-learning classes. She was awarded the inaugural Service Learning Award in 2006, and then again in 2012 for her dedicated service in this area. She has also received the Advisor of the Year Award (La Sierra University), the Outstanding Student Advising Award (National Academic Advising Association) and the Iris M. Landa Advising Award (La Sierra University). Dr. Martin has made outstanding teaching contributions through co-authoring a Health Psychology textbook (Allyn & Bacon, 2002) and several instructors' manuals. In addition, Dr. Martin has co-authored numerous peer-reviewed publications with her undergraduate students. It is her excellence at a broad range of teaching and mentoring activities that makes Professor Martin so deserving of the 2018 WPA Outstanding Teaching Award.



Allison Vaughn
Received the 2018 Early Career Research Award

Dr. Allison Vaughn is Associate Professor of Psychology at San Diego State University, where she also maintains affiliations with LGBTQ+ Studies, Women's Studies, and the Center for Sexuality and Sexual Health. She earned a BA from Cal Poly Pomona, an MA in Social Psychology from SDSU, and a Ph.D. in Social Psychology from the University of Utah.

Dr. Vaughn's research is at the intersection of social relationships, stigma, and health. Her work is both basic and applied, and aims to understand and reduce stigma, especially in the areas of sexual identity and health status. Her research in these areas has resulted in 27 peer reviewed publications, many of which are in top-tier journals. She has received funding for her research from the National Institutes of Health and San Diego State University and has been active in applying for funding from various institutes at NIH, National Science Foundation, and private foundations.

In addition to her personal accomplishments as a researcher, Dr. Vaughn is also actively involved with teaching and mentoring students in research. Her passion for research and teaching was described by her colleagues as "contagious" and she has received awards and recognition as an outstanding instructor and mentor. Many of her publications have included students as co-authors—both graduate and undergraduate. She is an active member of the WPA research community, and together with her students, has presented 34 papers and posters at WPA.

In recognition of her accomplishments as a researcher in the first 10 years of her career, the Western Psychological Association was pleased to recognize Dr. Allison Vaughn with the 2018 WPA Early Career Research Award.



Chris Cozby
**Received the 2018 Distinguished
Service Award**

Dr. Chris Cozby is Emeritus Professor of Psychology at California State University, Fullerton. He was an undergraduate at the University of California, Riverside, and received his Ph.D. in Psychology at the University of Minnesota. He is a Fellow of the American Psychological Association and the Western Psychological Association, and he is a member of the Association for Psychological Science.



Stewart Donaldson
**Received the 2018 Social Responsibility
Award**

Dr. Stewart I. Donaldson is the 2018 recipient of the Western Psychological Association Social Responsibility Award. The committee unanimously selected Dr. Donaldson based on his exceptional and consistent record of research and publications, theory based evaluations, and grants oriented toward promoting social justice and equality on a societal level, as well for the betterment of individuals' well-being and positive psychological outcomes. Dr. Donaldson has also shown leadership and service in furthering social justice, such as through his presidency of the American Evaluation Association, as well as mentoring many students to continue this work. Dr. Donaldson's research on promoting health, well-being, and social justice at and through the workplace is a prime example of his ability to meld research, evaluation, and social justice. He is currently working on research concerning culturally responsive and theory driven evaluation. He served as Director of the Graduate Education Diversity Internship (GEDI) Program, American Evaluation Association. His research has been funded by such agencies as the National Institute of Mental Health and the California Wellness Foundation.

**2018 Lifetime Achievement Award
goes to
Elizabeth Loftus**

Dr. Elizabeth Loftus is Distinguished Professor at the University of California - Irvine. She holds faculty positions in two departments: Psychology & Social Behavior; and Criminology, Law & Society. She received her Ph.D. in Psychology from Stanford University. Since then, she has published 22 books (including the award winning Eyewitness Testimony) and over 500 scientific articles. Loftus's research of the last 40 years has focused on the malleability of human memory. She has been recognized for this research with seven honorary doctorates and election to the Royal Society of Edinburgh, the American Philosophical Society, and the National Academy of Sciences. She is past president of the Association for Psychological Science, the Western Psychological Association, and the American Psychology-Law Society.

Dr. Christina Maslach is a Professor of Psychology (Emerita) at the University of California at Berkeley. She received her A.B. from Harvard, and her Ph.D. from Stanford. She has conducted research in a number of areas within social and health psychology. However, she is best known as the pioneering researcher on job burnout, producing the standard assessment tool, books, and award-winning articles. Among her other awards are: Fellow of the AAAS (1991 -- "For ground breaking work on the applications of social psychology to contemporary problems"), Professor of the Year (1997), and the 2017 Application of Personality and Social Psychology Award.

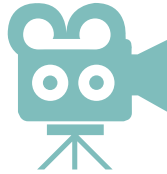

2018 WPA Film Festival Winners



The WPA Film Festival this year was under the direction of **Carrie M. Margolin**; the projectionists were **MaryAnn Mullins, Kate Suggs, Tyler Tristao**, and **Louis Van Camp**, all from The Evergreen State College. As at previous conventions, we asked each person viewing a film to rate its overall quality, using a 5-point scale ranging from 1 (Very Poor) through 5 (Very Good). A majority (82%) of the films received Good (4) to Very Good (5) average ratings and the overall mean rating was 4.32. The top two films received mean ratings of 4.74 to 4.86; these were designated as our Film Festival Winners for their exceptional quality. 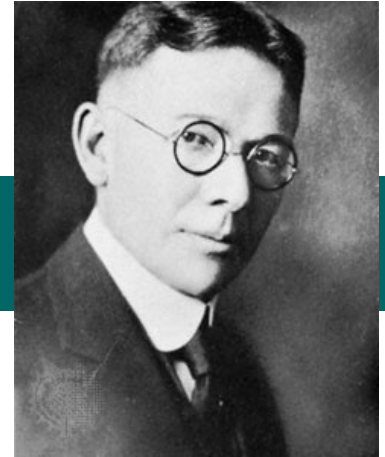

2019 Nominations Sought For WPA Awards

Mark Costanzo (Claremont McKenna College), Chair of the WPA Fellows and Awards Committee, is requesting nominations from members for awards in 2019 and beyond. The awards include the Outstanding Teaching Award, the Early Career Research Award (10 or fewer years post-Ph.D.), the Social Responsibility Award, and the Enrico E. Jones Award in Psychotherapy and Clinical Research.
