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Advice for getting the most from the conference

1. Familiarize Yourself with the Technology

Don't wait until the last minute to check that your computer is working. If you procrastinate, you could end up in a frustrating situation that causes you to miss some of the conference. In addition, check that your audio is functioning correctly, test your internet speed, and check out the features available on the conference platform.

2. Eliminate Distractions

Start by finding a quiet, comfortable space in which you can set up your computer. Tell anyone who might be tempted to call, text, or drop by that you're busy with a commitment that requires your full attention. Take advantage of scheduled breaks during the conference to use the bathroom, have lunch, etc.

3. Attend with colleagues

- Most virtual conferences encourage attendees to communicate through live chats, hashtags, and other tools. Sometimes, depending on the technology, you can even interact with the speaker by commenting or asking a question after the presentation.
- Another way to boost your social engagement during the conference is to attend "with" colleagues or coworkers.
 You could communicate with each other between sessions or perhaps schedule a Zoom or Skype meeting afterward to share key takeaways and discuss how the information you've learned might impact your own work.



To commemorate our 100th anniversary, WPA leadership created this beautiful chronicle of the history of the WPA.




